**Course Description**

*Pre/co-requisite: HPRB 4400*

This is a capstone course for students in the Health Promotion and Behavior major. It emphasizes professional development and online presence for careers in public health and prepares students for their professional life after graduation. It is primarily focused on the development of an online portfolio showcasing health promotion work. It also provides insight about networking with mentors and colleagues in online environments, preparing content optimized for the web and social media, and communicating clearly about one's professional identity and goals.

**Course Learning Objectives**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Develop a personal web platform and create an ePortfolio of professional health promotion work
2. Use social media to link and network with professional mentors and colleagues
3. Write for the web and create effective online content related to health promotion experiences
4. Articulate career goals and communicate in a professional manner

**Course Public Health Domains**

This course addresses the following public health domains:

- Health Communications, including:
  - Professional Writing
  - Use of Mass Media
  - Use of Electronic Technology

**Course Requirements**

**Attendance and Class Participation**

The structure of the course assumes that everyone is present. Students are responsible for all class content and announcements (e.g., reading assignments, instructions, schedule changes) whether they are present or not.

Additionally, attendance will be factored into final grades. Important points:

- It is important as a UGA student, to make sure you are keeping up with the work. Each student's presence and participation in discussions benefits all of those present. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to still become familiar with the information that was provided.
- Documentation is required for any absence to be excused (e.g., serious illness, grad school interview that could not be scheduled for a different time, presentation at a professional conference, required participation in a UGA sports event, major religious holiday observance). Please let me know that you will be absent before that class period, if at all possible, so that I can plan for that day's activities.

- You will lose points from your attendance grade for unexcused absences. The following are examples of inexcusable absences: scheduled flights or trips for recreational purposes, scheduled non-emergency doctor appointments (re-schedule them for a time you are not in class), picking up relatives at the airport, having family in town, etc.)
- If you are repeatedly/significantly late or leave early, I reserve the right to mark you as absent for that class session
- **IMPORTANT:** If you miss more than five class sessions, you will receive a failing grade.
- If you miss more than three classes before the withdrawal deadline, you will be dropped from the course.

## Course Readings

Students will be expected to complete readings in preparation for select class periods. Specific reading assignments will be available on eLC according to the class schedule. Each reading will be discussed in class and will directly inform the work done that day, so it is very important to complete the assigned readings.

## Technology Requirements

The primary objective of this class is to assist each student in creating an online portfolio and developing a professional online presence. For that reason, there are multiple technology requirements.

First, you will be expected to have a laptop computer in class, as we will complete many in-class activities and workshops. If you do not have a laptop to bring to the class, inform the instructor ASAP and alternative arrangements will be made. If your laptop is broken or not functioning, inform the instructor as soon as possible so a loaner laptop can be provided. If you come to class unprepared without a laptop or if you forget to charge your laptop and/or bring your charging cord, the instructor reserves the right to reflect this oversight in your attendance grade for that day.

Second, in lieu of a textbook, it is required that you purchase your own web domain (e.g., carolynlauckner.com) and hosting for your e-portfolio. This will cost you less than the amount that you would typically spend on a textbook. For example, if you register a domain and purchase basic hosting from bluehost.com, it will cost you less than \$60/year. You are welcome to shop around for the best price (see <http://b2evolution.net/web-hosting/budget-web-hosting-low-cost-lamp.php>), though I ask that all websites be created using Wordpress. We will set up our websites together in class, so it will be important to use a common platform.

## Required Assignments

Portfolio Milestones: These small assignments (10-30 pts/each) will be due the Monday before class and will help to ensure that you are making progress on your course assignments.

E-Portfolio: At the end of the semester, each student will turn in a completed e-Portfolio. This portfolio will be used to display work you have completed in the public health field and demonstrate your skillset to potential employers or colleagues. Additional criteria will be provided later in the semester.

E-Portfolio Presentation: An important aspect of being a public health professional is being able to describe your qualifications and “sell” yourself to potential employers. Thus, each student will be expected to complete a presentation that showcases your portfolio and describes your qualifications. More detail on presentation requirements will be provided later in the semester.

Reflective Essay: This 2-3 page (double-spaced) APA format essay will describe the pieces you chose to showcase in your portfolio, discuss why you chose those pieces and what skills and competencies they demonstrate, and explain how the pieces work together to communicate your professional identity.

Incompletes are awarded only under extraordinary circumstances and only with consultation with the instructor. There must be a written agreement between instructor and student regarding how/ when the coursework will be completed. Extension for completion of the work will not exceed one semester, after which time the “I” will convert to an “F”.

**E-mail and Communication:** It is your responsibility to check your UGA e-mail and remain abreast of course announcements. Anything I communicate via email should be considered official course information. I will make every effort to answer e-mails within 24 hours during the work week. Any emails sent during the weekend may not get a response until Monday morning. Remember this policy when due dates are close—if you send a question via email the night before something is due, you may not get a reply in time! If you have an urgent question/comment, write URGENT in the subject line.

**Grading:** Grades in this class are non-negotiable. The information that you need to keep track of your grade throughout the semester is in this syllabus, so please do not email asking about grade updates. If you believe a mistake was made in grading, double check the assignment requirements and the calculation for your grade. If you still believe there was a mistake, please let me know.

**Make-up Policy:** All materials must be submitted to eLC when they are due—extensions are the exception. Whenever possible, advanced notification to the instructor of any potential such situation is strongly advised. **Many milestones are due to ELC at 11:59pm the Monday before class—so make sure that you do not miss these deadlines!** Students should be advised that 15% of total points will be deducted for each day that assignments are turned in late. Anything turned in more than 2 days late will NOT be accepted.

### What do I do if I have COVID-19 symptoms?

Students showing COVID-19 symptoms should self-isolate and get tested. You can schedule an appointment with the University Health Center by calling 706-542-1162 (Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-5p.m.). ### What do I do if I test positive for COVID-19? (Isolation guidance)

As of December 29, 2021, when an individual receive a positive COVID-19 test: Everyone, **regardless of vaccination status**, should:

- Stay home for 5 days.
- If you have symptoms or your symptoms are resolving after 5 days, you can leave your house and return to class.
- Continue to wear a mask around others for 5 additional days.

### What do I do if I have been exposed to COVID-19? (Quarantine guidance)

If you have been exposed (within 6 feet for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period – unmasked\*\*) to someone with COVID-19 or to someone with a positive COVID-19 test and you are:

- Boosted, or have become fully vaccinated within the last 6 months (Moderna or Pfizer vaccine) or within the last 2 months (J&J vaccine)
  - You do not need to quarantine at home and may come to class.
  - You should wear a mask around others for 10 days.
  - If possible, get tested on day 5.
  - If you develop symptoms, get tested and isolate at home until test results are received, then proceed in accordance with the test results.
- Unvaccinated, or became fully vaccinated more than 6 months ago (Moderna or Pfizer vaccine) or more than 2 months ago (J&J vaccine) and have not received a booster:
  - You must quarantine at home for 5 days. After that you may return to class but continue to wear a mask around others for 5 additional days.
  - If possible, get tested on day 5.
  - If you develop symptoms, get tested and isolate at home until test results are received, then proceed in accordance with the test results.
